Graham's Reflection

Greetings Church!

Can you believe that half the year has now passed? When did that happen? It is the new Financial Year, and as the weather cools down, some of our church treasurers are probably feeling a little hot under the collar as they work towards new systems of financial management to link in with the wider church.

This month I have been drawn towards the lectionary readings for July. The Gospel reading for 3 July from Luke 10:1-20 is so appropriate as it reflects the essence of so many congregational conversations I have had across the Mary Burnett. Here are the first 4 verses:

After this the Lord appointed seventy others and sent them on ahead of him in pairs to every town and place where he himself intended to go. He said to them, "The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few; therefore ask the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into his harvest. Go on your way. See, I am sending you out like lambs into the midst of wolves. Carry no purse, no bag, no sandals; and greet no one on the road. (Luke 10:1-4)

While this passage has many significant images and teachings, let me just quickly touch on 2 areas: the shortage of workers, and the lack of money.

The first area I am sure, seems very self-evident, the church is short on labourers. We struggle to find ministers to fill vacant placements, and congregations struggle to find volunteers and workers to meet their ministry needs and missional goals.

However, I am beginning to think that we are losing sight of the real urgency and importance of the purpose of the church.

As church membership decreases, so does our perception of the extent of the harvest that is before us. If we only look at the view within our church walls, we will fail to see the true need for faithful labourers. The harvest lies not in our congregations, but in the community around us where people seek more than ever for hope, joy, purpose and a future worth living for.

The challenge from Jesus to us today is more than about filling preaching rosters or church council seats; these are not the workers Jesus is looking for. It sounds like a line out of Star Wars, doesn't it? - "These are not the droids you are looking for." The truth is God does not need robot-like workers to faithfully, and almost mechanically carry out internal church tasks, God is calling people who have a true heart for Him, for Jesus, for the Gospel and most importantly – for the lost. The real work – the plentiful harvest lies out there in the community around us. Jesus goes on to say, "Ask the Lord of the harvest, therefore, to send out workers into His harvest."

The second point I mentioned was the lack of money. Along with our current falling numbers and workers, is a reduction in our financial capacity to continue along in our tried and tested ways of being the church. It is challenging, but is it as challenging as Jesus sending out the seventy trailblazers and saying, "leave your purse at home"? These people stepped out in faith, trusting in the provision of God, and eventually returned with amazing stories about the power and magnitude of that providence. The church needs to learn to have this kind of faith again before it will truly experience this extravagant grace and provision of God to support and empower the work that we are sent to undertake. I think we are sometimes too focussed on what we **don't** have, that we for get altogether about what we **do** have.


'And my God will meet all your needs according to the riches of his glory in Christ Jesus.' (Philippians 4:19)

Synod Report

A Day in the Life of a Congregational Synod Rep

The 36th Synod of the Uniting Church in Queensland was held at Alex Park conference centre on the Sunshine Coast from Saturday 14th to Tuesday 17th May 2022. It was my privilege to represent the Bundaberg congregation of the Uniting Church at this forum along with Stuart.

I outlined recently that going to Synod was a bit like being a small fish in a big pool in that it was a large forum of people, all with a range of reasons for being in attendance but with a common belief in the faithfulness of our lord Jesus Christ to us his people. Approximately 200 members of synod were in attendance and 50 attended remotely via live streaming. Many were ministers of the word, people who worked in church organisations or just plain little old reps like me. So what is a typical day like at Synod.

- 1. The first and perhaps most important part of Synod is the worship and bible study that starts off the day at 8:30am. There is really something quite stirring singing out his praises in a group of more than 200. Bible study or perhaps more accurately bible discussion was undertaken by a group of presenters who analysed various aspects of the bible with a specific focus. For the 36th Synod the focus was "Daring Hope". What does this mean for us in attendance? This period of time created opportunities for members to personally reflect prior to the business of the meeting. This took about an hour.
- 2. The Moderator then takes to the chair and the business of the meeting commences. Reports are tabled from organisations such as Uniting Care, Wesley Mission, School boards, The board of Trinity College (training organisation responsible for theological training) and the Property, investment and Finance board to name a few. One hour is spent with one of these UC organisations presenting a report and time given to questions and responses to these questions.

3. Back to business, which may well be general business where proposals are tabled and discussed. Proposals are where the proposer outlines a document which aims to outline change or refinement of policies and practices of synod. These are discussed and examined by the synod and a system of voting occurs where people respond with either orange or blue cards. Orange for warm to the proposal or blue which signifies cool to the proposal. If the chairman sees mostly orange responses he can test the floor by calling a straw vote, whereby members show their cards. Synod operates under consensus which means even if one blue card is shown then that person is given the opportunity to speak and either gain clarity or outline their problem with the proposal. One and a half hours

Lunch and networking 1 hour

4. After lunch we could continue in small discussion groups where the current proposals on the floor could be discussed within a group of 10 or 12. This was good in that you got to discuss with a smaller group the issues. Not having to dauntingly face the whole of synod. Hour and a half

Afternoon Smoko and networking

- 5. A facilitation group is present at Synod and this group collates all the group discussion points and present these to the full synod. After more wordsmithing the proposal may then again be put up for voting upon to which the same process as outlined above is undertaken. 1 hour
- 6. By late afternoon another report from a UC agency is received and discussed and by then significant brain fading seems to set in.

Evening meal

7. After evening meal there is often an activity or guest lecture that is held and by 8pm you head off to your accommodation for a well-earned rest.

As can be seen by this outline Synod is quite busy. This was my third Synod and I guess I felt I got more from this one than the other 2 because I could see the machinery at work more clearly this time. No decision at Synod is made in the absence of prayer and consideration of God's mission for us as his church. Chaplains are in attendance for people who require spiritual help deliberating or relating to issues some of which may create pain and anxiety. Synod is a safe place for all.

The purpose of synod is to carry out the needs of the church it serves. Much of the specific detail of current proposals and reports will no doubt be available through the UC's website, which I recommend to you.

Policy update: Child Safe Policy Framework 2022

The UCA is committed to righting the wrongs of the past and to sustained reconciliation and the continuous renewal of trust with the community. The National Safe Church Unit (NSCU) team has collaborated with Synod Safe Church Leads to update the framework to ensure that our approach remains contemporary and best practice. It includes the 10 Principles of a Child Safe UCA and guidance to help implement them in all of our UCA spaces.

A spotlight is on principle 5: *Our people are suitable for working with children and committed to the values of child safety and wellbeing.*

Recruitment and screening of all people who work or volunteer within the synod is a vital part of us all working together. A key aspect of our mission is to fulfil our commitment to the safety and well-being of our community. We must ensure we conduct appropriate child-safe activities across the Church. We will be intentional with our people, exploring values, understanding motivations for working with anyone vulnerable, including children and ensuring ongoing training and supervision to maintain awareness and vigilance amongst our communities. Gympie Floods February 2022

Being deployed as a Chaplain by Chaplaincy Australia is a privilege in any scenario, but being asked to undertake this role in my home town of Gympie was of particular interest and I approached it with gusto.

Gympie Queensland, over the last few weeks has been inundated with trillions of gallons of water, seeing unprecedented flooding, only just a few inches less than the largest ever recorded deluge which occurred over 100 years ago. More than 5,000 homes received significant damage, and in some cases irreparable destruction, but worse still, local lives were lost in the battle to keep themselves and others safe.

What I found as chaplain, was that although much of the damage to this area was visible to the naked eye, some of the broken and damaged roads and bridges were not apparent until the water level dropped. So too, is the emotional and physical devastation of the people affected. Once they had a chance to let the situation penetrate, they were faced with immensely heightened emotions of loss, pain, anxiety, and in some cases, sheer panic.

I will share a little bit about one man I met and am still assisting. I guess you could call him a true nomad, choosing to live in his car and travel around Australia picking up work where he could, but thoroughly enjoying the freedom that his lifestyle provided. He had parked up for the night in a layby in Gympie, and was awoken at 3am to the sight of floodwater half-way up his windscreen. Incredibly he managed to escape through the window of his quickly-submerging vehicle, and began to swim blindly in the hope of finding dry land and safety. This was no easy feat, with fast-flowing flood waters, coupled with his age, a severe medical condition and darkness, his thoughts, he said, hastened to his impending death. Incredibly, he managed to find himself within reach of the roof of a submerged grand-stand which he climbed onto and hugged the roof. Fortunately, the amazing skill, eagle-eyes, and quick-thinking of our SES team, he was spotted and picked up and examined by the Queensland Ambulance Service and later taken to the safety of the evacuation centre. I have seen him every day since, and as all his clothing, shoes, documents and belongings were lost, I felt privileged to buy him a few personal belongings to help make his 'new normal' a little more bearable. Although he doesn't believe in God, he does recognise a greater power intervened in his rescue.... like I said, I'm still working with him... watch this space.

I am writing this reflection on day 6 after the peak of the flood, so Gympie is still in the midst of the situation, and I have many similar stories of rescue and hope. I am continuing to care for some individuals suffering critical mental health problems as a result of this disaster, but by the grace of God, and the support of Chaplaincy Australia and other services, I truly believe that they will pull through and once again, live a full and purposeful life.

Despite the flood waters having now dropped to a level that most roads and bridges are exposed once again, not all are accessible. Food and supplies are running low, but thankfully the trucks are moving again both in and out, bringing greatly needed consumable replenishments and medical necessities.

The clean-up and recovery period has begun. Even the Army have been deployed here to lend a much-needed hand to the situation. I spent 3 full days (until they closed) at the main evacuation centre in the middle of town. Many displaced families and individuals found themselves in make-shift accommodation relying on the care and kindness of strangers. What I have seen over that past week, has made my heart swell with pride. People rallying together donating food, clothing, their time, and sheer elbow grease, to help lighten the burden of the problems we all were experiencing. Such unselfish kindness, that exceeds anything I've experienced before. I believe we all have that Godly desire within us (whether all believe in Him or not), to emulate good and to want the best for our fellow human beings.

Our training and expertise as chaplains really comes into play at such a time as this. I prayed fervently for God to guide me, by His Spirit to those I could assist, and to the ways I could best help them. God is so good, and never disappoints. He cares so much for His children, and understands their pain. It is our faith in a loving God who through Jesus Christ has defeated even death; who tells us to be anxious for nothing, but by everything by prayer and supplication, with thanks-giving, let our requests me known to God and that His peace, which surpasses all understanding, will guard our hearts and minds through Christ. (phillipians 4:6-7)

Let us, through these tragedies, take some time out rediscover who we are in Christ and to re-examine where we need to be placed to benefit His calling upon our lives and those we are called to shepherd. These times of self-examination, especially through times of trial, are vitally important for our spiritual health. We must allow ourselves to be re-shaped by God as we grow in our faith towards Him.
