

Reflection - Ps Graham Huth

Greetings Presbytery, and welcome to Spring, a season of renewal within Creation, which we pray will also be reflected within the life of the Church. The terms 'green shoots', 'renewal' and 'revitalisation' have become a consistent and pronounced part of Uniting Church vocabulary of late as we look forward with anticipation to the way Christ, through the aift of the Spirit, will renew his church.

"The Sovereign Lord will show his justice to the nations of the world. Everyone will praise Him! His righteousness will be like a garden in early spring, with plants springing up everywhere." Isaiah 61:11 (NLT)



Passages like the one above from Isaiah offer great hope of refreshment and growth. However, I often consider the fact that we want renewal, as long as we also get to hang onto the past. The lectionary readings for the first Sunday in September challenge us to recognise and let go of everything that prevents us from experiencing the potential of what God can do in our lives. Are we willing to give up our present comfort to find greater something far more valuable when we yield control of our lives, and our church, to God?

In Luke 14:25-33, Jesus turns to the crowd and speaks words that are anything but comfortable: "If anyone comes to me and does not hate father and mother, wife and children... yes, even their own life—such a person cannot be my disciple." He's not advocating hostility, but radical reordering. Discipleship, He says, costs everything. It's not a casual commitment—it's a total surrender.

This echoes the image in Jeremiah 18:1-11, where God sends the prophet to the potter's house. There, Jeremiah sees clay being shaped on the wheel. When the vessel is marred, the potter doesn't discard it—he reshapes it into something new. "Like clay in the hand of the potter, so are you in my hand," says the Lord.

Together, these passages offer a profound truth: to be a disciple of Jesus Christ, we must be willing to give up everything so that God can form us into something new.

As individuals and as congregations, we often come to God with our plans, our identities, our comforts intact. But clay doesn't dictate its shape. The potter does. And Jesus makes clear that following Him means laying down our rights to self-determination.

This surrender isn't punitive—it's creative. God doesn't crush us to discard us. He reshapes us to reflect His glory. But are we really willing to go that far, because reshaping requires soft clay? Hardened hearts resist the wheel. Stiff pride cracks under pressure. Only those willing to be undone can be remade.

Consider Jim Elliot, the missionary who gave his life reaching the unreached in Ecuador. He famously said, "He is no fool who gives what he cannot keep, to gain what he cannot lose." His surrender led to a legacy that still inspires.

So, what must we surrender? Perhaps it's control. Perhaps it's reputation. Perhaps it's relationships, buildings, independence, habits, obsessions, possessions, or even dreams. Jesus doesn't ask for part of us—He asks for all. And in return, God offers something far greater: a life shaped by grace, purpose, and eternal significance.

We must be soft clay in God's hands. May we count the cost and find it worth it. And may we become true disciples—not by clinging to what we were, but by surrendering to what He is making us to be. Then we will experience renewal.

May the eternal and perfect Joy of the Lord Spring forth in your life.

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A Summary of the new MDF structure

Synod has created two new endowment funds to support Church Renewal and Covenant Ministry for generations to come. These two funds have clear guiding principles and a funding strategy to support their growth and to ensure they can support the church's mission for years to come.

Effective from 19th May 2025 the policy will apply to all sales of property held in the name of the Property Trust. MDF accounts prior to 19th May 2025 will not be affected however congregations are welcome to contribute to either or both the new funds.

Church Renewal Fund - minimum 10%

- Capital Endowment fund overseen by the FIPB (Finance, Investment and Property Board)
- Annual budget to be set by FIPB, administered by MC3 (Mission Collaboration and Coordination Committee)
- Specified criteria
- Pooled for Synod-wide use
- Relational oversight by MC3

Covenant Ministry Fund - minimum 5%

- Capital Endowment fund overseen by FIPB
- Annual budget set by FIPB, administered by UAICC RCQ (Uniting Aboriginal and Islander Christian Congress Regional Council Queensland)
- Specified criteria
- Pooled for Synod-wide use
- Relational oversight by UAICC RCQ

A minimum of 10% of the net proceeds of a sale of property is allocated to the Church Renewal Fund and a minimum 5% is allocated to the Covenant Ministry Fund. The responsible body will have the option, after prayerful discernment, to allocate more proceeds to the new funds and to transfer any portion of their existing MDF holdings to the new funds.

Some exclusions would apply, such as selling a manse for the purpose of purchasing a replacement manse, if the 'sale' is a transfer of the status of Responsible Body from one Church entity to another Church entity, as legal title remains in the Property Trust or where legal requirements are in place as bequest instructions, or other special trusts that may be in place for schools and other entities.

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
